

Breakdown of the actual numbers in the USDOJ, EPA, WV, and Chemours settlement documents

Claims that Chemours agreed to a \$450 million settlement with the U.S. Department of Justice, EPA and West Virginia are inaccurate. That number is not in the agreement and has no basis in the actual terms.

DOJ and Chemours' claims	The reality
Chemours will pay a civil penalty of \$22.5 million for alleged violations	Chemours will pay \$22.5 million. The settlement states that Chemours cannot afford to pay more, despite the fact that it is multi-billion dollar company.
\$90 million program to mitigate PFAS discharges	There is no \$90 million program to mitigate discharges. There is only a \$90 million dollar CAP on the maximum that Chemours has to spend on such projects. Many of those projects do not require any measurable reduction in PFAS pollution and therefore do not guarantee any protections for communities.
\$60 million on pollution controls for surface water discharges and air emissions in W.V.	There is no requirement that Chemours spend \$60 million—that number is not in the settlement, and there is no evidence that the company will spend close to that amount.
Drinking water for communities at an estimated cost of \$280 million	There is no requirement that Chemours spend \$280 million—that number is not in the settlement, and there is no evidence that the company will spend close to that amount. Moreover, the agreement focuses on just two PFAS chemicals in drinking water, even though Chemours is known to release hundreds of PFAS substances—many of which contaminate local water sources.
